Local Bloodhounds Take Top Honours

The Four Shires Bloodhounds, the registered pack in the area, swept to glory at Houndshow 2005 - for a record-breaking fifth time.

The homebred pack again took the top parading title at this year's Houndshow held at Staffordshire County Showground. With more hounds even than Crufts - over 2,800 hounds participated - it is the largest hound show in the world.

[The Four Shires' mixed pack of dogs and bitches come up against stiff competition from other packs in the class from all over England and Wales including Beagles, Bassett Hounds and even 28 couple - that's 56 - Griffinhounds. The runners-up were the Albany Bassett Hounds from Herefordshire.

The popular local pack, which "hunts the clean boot" - the natural scent of man, were awarded top prize and the cup for their performance, discipline and overall condition. "No one could touch them", said the judge, Mr David

Palmer, MFH, from Worcestershire. Hounds were paraded by Huntsman, Tracey MacTaggart from Ashford-in-the Water, together with whippers-in Tim Leeman, MBH from Cutthorpe and Annie Turner from Rowland. Maggie Pearlstine, senior Master of the Four Shires Bloodhounds, said: "This fifth win is a testament to the hard work that our Huntsman, Tracey MacTaggart, and her team have put in over the years breeding biddable hounds with excellent noses."

Confirmation November 2005

Revd Clive Thrower writes

Confirmation is the service of personal commitment to Christ, making promises before a bishop. It is the gateway to full membership of the Church of England (e.g. it is a requirement before becoming a member of the PCC or a deanery synod representative).

This year there are fewer confirmations than in previous years as there is one less bishop in the diocese until Bishop Alastair Redfean takes up the reins. The confirmation this November at St. Giles church, Great Longstone, will have candidates from several of our parishes. A series of six preparation sessions is offered for younger (Y6 into teens) candidates. The session start at 7pm and the titles (and dates) are: Myself/ Fellowship (Oct 12), Jesus/The Holy Spirit (Oct 19), The Bible/Church (Nov 2), Faith/Creeds (Nov 9), Sacraments (Nov 16). On Sunday 27 November there will be a lunch at 1.00pm at Longstone vicarage followed by a session on discipleship and practical aspects of receiving communion, then a rehearsal in church at 3.30pm.

Mature candidates should contact me to talk through what preparation, if any, they would like to receive before being confirmed. Mature candidates are also invited to the lunch at the vicarage, afternoon session and rehearsal.

Parish Notes

The meeting started with questions and comments from the public. Sue Walker of Moor Road said that she had been in touch with the council concerning Chertpit lane for a number of months. When not receiving a satisfactory answer to her questions had written again. This time she had received an answer, which stated that the lane had been inspected and the first section from Scratte is suitable for cars; it then becomes too narrow for 4-wheel drives. The letter also stated that the council had no money for the upkeep of the lane. Sue pointed out that if it is too narrow for 4X4's - what is the point of making it a by-way open to all traffic?

Jo Gregory (Chairman) said that she too had been in contact with the council over this matter. She had also been given information by Mike Scawen showing how the North Yorkshire County Council had dealt with the problem in their National Park. Stephen Barton pointed out that the letter received from the council had not answered the parish council's questions, but that Sue had made a valuable point.

It was decided that David Burns should write to the County Council and ask for a site meeting.

The meeting then opened with apologies from Margaret Ward, Paul Dalton and Gordon Bowring for their absence.

Police Matters – Hugh Wright said that Neighbourhood Watch had reported three suspicious men who had stopped outside both Longstone Church and Calver Church. However, nothing seemed to have been taken. He also pointed out that not many people had signed up for Neighbourhood Watch and more people were needed to make this service effective.

Jo Gregory has spoken to the Ashford council with regards to arranging a joint meeting to discuss the problems caused by South Lodge.

School Matters – Jo had received a copy of a letter from Margaret Ward. Margaret has decided to resign from the board of governors of Longstone School.

Planning Matters – The only application was for an extension to siting a temporary caravan at Orrs Farm. There were two planning decision notices – both granted – one for an extension at Mulberry House, Barn Furlong and the other for retrospective permission for a conservatory at 15 Edge View Drive. Both were granted.

Financial Matters – payments were approved which included a donation of £100 to Great Longstone Senior Citizens Club. The councillors then discussed the monthly financial statement.

Maintenance – The work at the bus shelter has been started by Nick Smith and will be finished soon. Signs have been acquired by the council stating that access is required at all times to stop people parking at the top of Sunny Bank and Spring Bank, which both have vehicular access on to the Rec. Peter Askew, who has parked his car by the gate on Spring Bank for the past 45 years, said that he had taken advice from his solicitor who advises him that due to the number of years he has parked there he has the right to continue. If anyone wanted access he would willingly move his car. Hugh Wright suggested that the signs should be put up and for them to wait and see what happens.

It has been reported that the pavements in Grisedale Road, Furnall Ave. and Glebe Ave are in a very poor condition and it was decided to write to Derbyshire County Council asking for them to be done. Hugh asked that it is impressed

on them to do a better job than last time. The footpath that runs between Grisedale Rd and Glebe Ave was also in a bad state of repair. David Burns said that the footpath inspector was in the village during the week and had inspected all the paths. Church Lane has started to be resurfaced and Jo reported that the road would also be sprayed with tar in September. Residents at Barn Furlong have been perturbed that there is no signage warning motorists that there is no pavement – David Burns was asked to write to the Highways Department asking for this to be rectified.

Grisedale Road electrical sub station was very overgrown with weeds and Jo had been on to the relevant authorities who would be coming to tackle the problem soon.

Recreation Ground – Jo reported that work had started on the cricket pavilion and that the response from local people had been fantastic. Jimmy Long had already started on the work and Martin Bradwell is going to start on the roof. Many other people had also volunteered to get the pavilion back to being weatherproof before the winter and this showed how the village, the parish council, the cricket club and the lads were all pulling together.

Gordon Bowering had advised that one particular contractor be awarded the job of renovating the rec path as both quotes were similar and that the council knew the quality of this particular company's work. David Burns said that the footpath inspector had immediately recognised that the path by the school needed action and would ask the corporate services department to send a surveyor who would report to the school.

Allotments – both the allotments discussed at the last meeting have got new tenants, who, according to Chris Raynor have already started work on them.

Village Hall – Hugh pointed out that the new licensing act would affect the village hall; David Burns said that this was in hand and Hugh offered to draw a plan of the hall for the application.

Post box – Jo had been asked by some parishioners why nothing had been done about the new box and reported that Mr L'Estrange from the Post office would meet councillors on the 20th August. She felt that the councillors should meet before that time to discuss the matter; this was arranged for the following Monday.

Council-owned land – Mark Garret has made an excellent job of the new gate for the quarry on Moor Lane. It has been installed to stop fly tipping. Unfortunately two of the tenants had objected to the gate and felt that they should have been given notice, so had removed it on at least three occasions and had caused some damage. Jo felt it was a poor show because this had all been discussed with the tenants before it was installed.

Recycling – The council had asked the District Council to install green waste bins for use by people who have not been given green wheelie bins. This has been refused. The council was also unable to say how many people did not have wheelies. The meeting was closed at this point to allow discussion with non-council members. It appears that if you do not have a wheelie bin there is now no way that you can get your green waste collected unless you are prepared to pay for the privilege or can drive to Stonegravels waste tip in Chesterfield. District Councillor James Bentley asked for details and said that he would ask questions about this situation. There were numerous items of correspondence.

September in the Garden

Lawns – Aerate, apply sand or compost and scarify to remove debris. Re-seed worn patches and apply autumn fertiliser. Control weeds, fungal infections and moss.

Roses – remove faded blooms; continue to spray against mildew and aphids. Scatter sulphate of potash on beds and hoe in. Tie the shoots of climbers into a fan shape.

Herbaceous plants – continue to dead head and cutting back. Keep hoeing to control weeds.

Dahlias – check ties as autumn gales can cause damage. Feed once a fortnight with liquid fertiliser for better blooms.

Chrysanthemums – select best outdoor varieties and label for propagating. Gladioli – leave new corms undisturbed until fully matured.

Sweet Peas – purchase seed for sowing next month.

Bulbs – plant between shrubs or herbaceous plants on rock gardens or in lawns, preferably in groups.

Vegetables – sow lettuce for overwintering, plant spring cabbage, lift main crop carrots and store in layers in deep boxes.

Fruit – complete summer pruning of apples and pears. Pick autumn raspberries and harvest blackberries, cut out old growth and tie in new shoots.

General Tasks – clear away remains of crops that have finished. Order bulbs, roses, herbaceous plants, shrubs and fruit bushes if required. Take cuttings of evergreen shrubs, geraniums and hydrangeas. Check electrical installations are in working order before the winter. Check gutter and drains are free of leaves and debris.
